Introduction.

Oldham SACRE has continued to receive significant support and encouragement via Oldham Council. The Council has remained an active and interested supporter of SACRE and its officers regularly attend meetings and have secured the resources that keep it in good health.

In the course of the year Oldham SACRE said farewell to Mrs Karen Holmes, Clerk to SACRE for over 20 years and Mr David Barter who moved to another local authority. Both were formally thanked for their support for the SACRE.

The annual conference sponsored by Oldham Council has brought notable speakers; with a high profile in Religious Education to contribute to training and for the first time the conference was held in the European Islamic Centre in Oldham. Thanks were expressed for the use of facilities and opportunity to explore the centre as a focus for educational visits. The teachers taking part in the Getting to Good Project (re-baptised "Getting to GR8") welcomed the support Alan Brine HMI and Ms Naomi Anstiss as consultant.

Oldham Council also continued to promote a structure of subject leads in primary and secondary phases and several RE network meetings took place with the leads reporting to SACRE regularly.

A group of schools began the Getting to GR8 pilot using **RE QUALITY MARK (REQM)** as a tool for school improvement. SACRE was grateful for the funding for the consultancy from Culham St Gabriel

Rochdale and Oldham SACREs have met jointly in the past and links were maintained throughout the year and collaboration with the Mr Peter Owen, officer for Rochdale SACRE was maintained.

The SACRE produced an annual plan which has been monitored by an RE consultant and designated officers in the Council. SACRE welcomed the transitional arrangements to ensure the appointment of a new clerk to SACRE, put in place by Oldham Council.

Whilst grateful for the time members have given to support SACRE, concerns were expressed about the regular attendance of members with some meetings barely quorate.

It was intended to look towards making the meetings as inviting as possible.

Support for maintaining standards in RE

Throughout 2015-16 academic year, support for RE in Oldham continued to be provided by a consultant, funded for 10 days by Oldham Council. Consultant support was provided by an RE professional who had supported SACRE for several years. Tasks included, convening and chairing teacher network meetings, leading training sessions on RE for schools, reporting to SACRE, helping to organise events such as Conferences and Network meetings, monitoring provision and standards in schools and developing strategies to encourage schools to review provision for RE in the light of developments and changes to the curriculum and the implementation of a new Religious Education syllabus.

The key messages in the Agreed Syllabus for Religious Education launched, in 2013 for implementation in 2014, were; the importance of knowledge and understanding, reflecting and responding and enquiring and working creatively as a basis for lively religious education.

Additionally, Oldham Association of Secondary Headteachers provided resources for supporting the maintenance of standards. Their representative, Ms Rachael Sunderland has attended SACRE regularly. SACRE has also received support from school leaders in Primary schools especially from the subject lead Mrs Sue Callaghan, Headteacher of Christ Church CE School Denshaw.

Subject leads that began work in 2014 were co-opted to SACRE and liaised with the consultant electronically through the Oldham "FIRST CLASS" intranet and have provided ongoing mutual specialist support to colleagues in schools through the "First Class" **RE Conference Website**. The SACRE was keen to explore the way in which subject networks for RE in both phases could be energised in the light of the overall changes to curriculum provision in order to secure the spreading of best practice and challenging schemes of work. The major documents supporting the Agreed Syllabus and the Agreed Syllabus itself were available electronically to download from the Oldham Council website.



Annual Conference 2015

Oldham Council supported a conference for religious education practitioners, school governors and members of SACRE at The European Islamic Centre Oldham which was well attended by over 70 professionals and provided an ideal opportunity to refresh teaching strategies developed from the Oldham Agreed Syllabus. Workshop opportunities were provided including; Engaging boys in Religious Education, The RE Quality Mark with Naomi Anstiss and Sue Callaghan, The school linking Project with Mrs Suzy Chapman and GCSE planning which involved joint working with Rochdale Secondary schools led by Rachael Sunderland and Aisha Mohammed.

The central sessions included a keynote speech with an overview of Oldham's new Agreed Syllabus from Lat Blaylock (REToday).

The workshops were popular and evaluations indicated a desire for more opportunities for professional development in the future.

Professional development programme 2015-2016

Network meetings for Primary and secondary colleagues and an open meeting took place during the year with major focus on supporting the Religious Education Quality Mark, The Getting to Good Project and Approaches to Assessment in the new GCSE syllabuses from AQA.

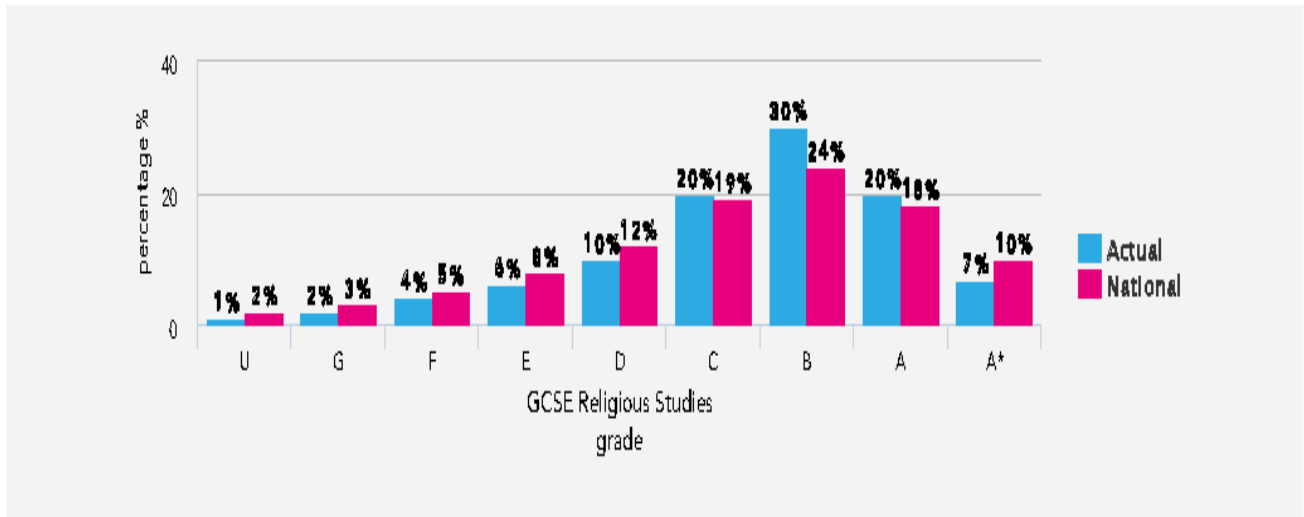

1174 pupils completed a full course in GCSE Religious Studies in 2015 which is an increase on the 2014 figure of 981. The percentage of pupils achieving A*-C Grade decreased from 81.9% to 76% in 2015. The overall A*-C Grade percentage in Oldham at full GCSE was 5% above the national average, a decrease from 2014 (11.2% above the national average.)

LA Grade distribution 2015 · actual results · 1174 pupils

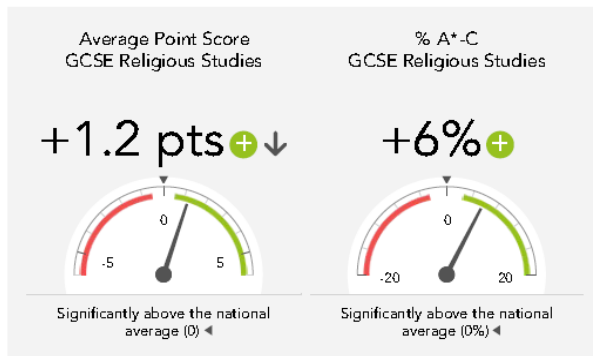


The percentage of pupils achieving Grades A*-C was significantly above the National Average (71%). The average points score (APS) 42 points was significantly above the National Average (41 points)

Value Added

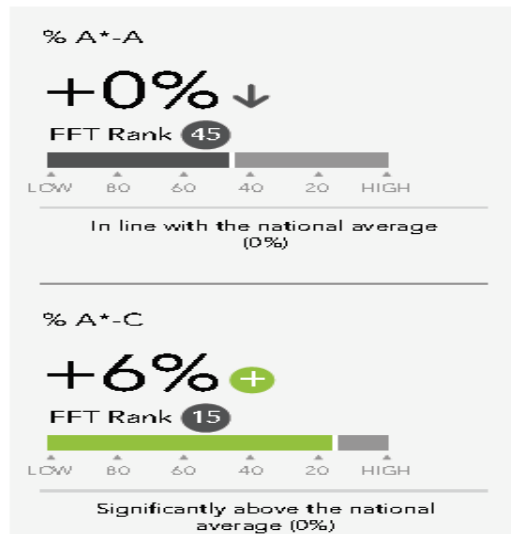
The Fischer Family Trust provides data about Value Added (VA). The system of analysis allows the achievement of pupils to be compared with other pupils nationally taking into account gender and month of birth as starting points. In Oldham pupils achieved an average points score significantly above the average, however this was lower than the previous year. Compared with other pupils nationally the pupils in Oldham achieving A*-C in Religious Studies were significantly above average nationally in terms of value added.

Shown as a bar chart below, pupil achievement A*-C was placed in the top 20% of all schools and significantly above average whilst the achievement of pupils achieving A*-A grades was in line with pupils' achievement nationally.

The table below shows that whilst the number of pupils making 3 or 4 levels of progress was significantly positive, there was a decline in all areas compared to 2014 except the number of pupils achieving a GCSE grade A-G in 2015 which remained stable at 99%.

In 2015 attainment A*-A declined from 48% to 26% and progress declined from 16% in 2014. The performance of higher attainers in 2015 was significantly negative as shown in the table below whilst those with low prior attainment did significantly better at A*-A grades.

The attainment of boys was below that of girls although both groups performed significantly better than other pupils nationally.

Based on prior attainment apart from high attainers, middle and low attainers were significantly above the national average, middle attainers did less well than similar groups in 2014.

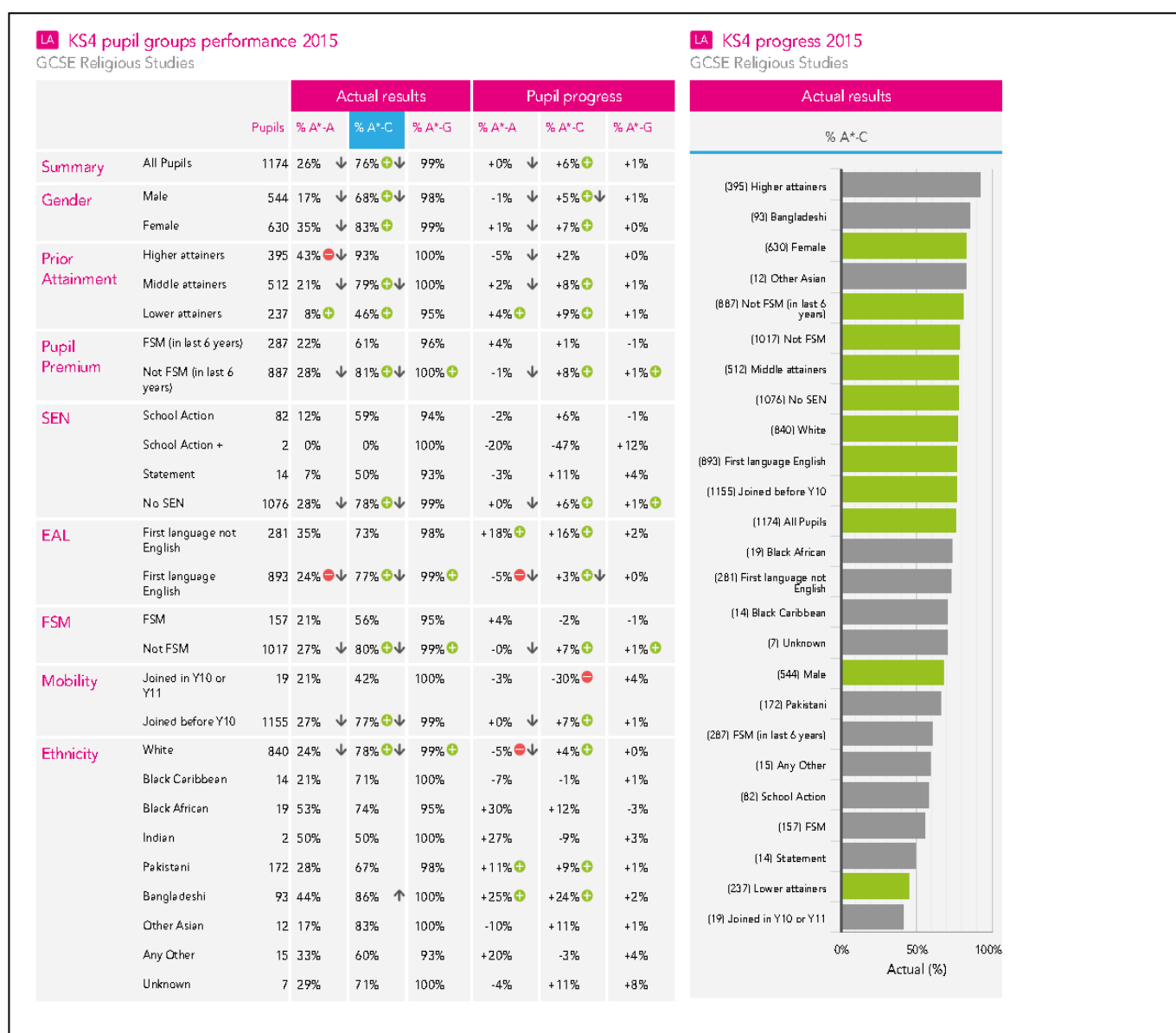
Analysis of full GCSE 2015 Male and Female and performance of groups

The number of female candidates entered for the subject was 630 and male candidates 544.

The percentage of females achieving A*-C grade was 83% which was significantly above the national average and the percentage of males achieving grade A*-C was 68%, also significantly above the national average but a decline from 2014.

35 % of females achieved at the highest grade level (A*A) and 17% of males achieved at the highest grade (A*A) a decline from the previous year. Overall both males and females made positive progress, girls' progress being significantly positive at A*A & A*-C grades but for males negative at A*A grades, which was a decline from 2014. The progress made by males at grades A*-G was positive and for females, average. The bar chart shows positives in green at A*-C grades.

Oldham Council - Overall performance 2015



Pupils with first language not English made significantly better progress in 2015. Pakistani and Bangladeshi heritage pupils also made significantly better progress especially at the higher grades A*-A. The analysis indicates some pupils joining in Y10 and 11 did not make the progress expected.

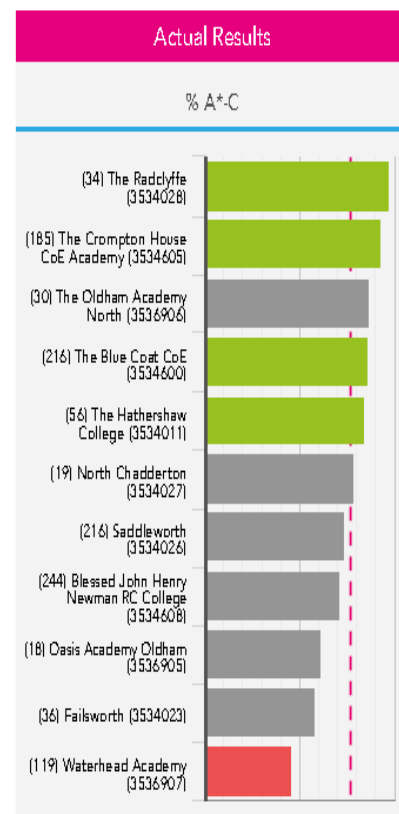
